Parent Contributions

PARENTAL COPAYMENT: POINTS TO CONSIDER

- Virginia currently has a flat rate per-child with a 7% cap and copayments are waived for families at or below 100% FPL. **As a result, Virginia families are contributing an average of 2% of gross income.**
- According to JLARC, the average copayment in 2018 was \$82/month. Current average copayment is \$77/month (see chart on following slide) even though Virginia has increased household income limit up to the federal maximum, 85% of SMI.
- Federal regulations:
 - Require copayments and set a cap of 7% of gross income.
 - Encourage sliding scale to ensure affordability, noting that states can waive co-payments for families at or below 150% of FPL, families with children in foster/kinship care, families with children with disabilities, families experiencing homelessness, and children enrolled in Head Start or Early Head Start.
 - States may not increase co-payments during the 12-month eligibility period and must reduce co-payments if there is a reduction in earnings.
- Changing the current copayment policy for Child Care Subsidy, Mixed Delivery and/or VPI requires a change to Virginia's Biennial Budget.

CCSP OPTIONS: INCREASE COPAYS, SERVE MORE KIDS

Up to 3,030 birth-to-five slots could be funded with additional parental contributions. See following slides for detail.

B) DOUBLE COPAYMENTS TO SERVE MORE KIDS

Up to 1,660 birth-to-five CCSP slots could be supported if current copayments were doubled (up to 7%) and families under 100% FPL were charged a \$5/month.

C) INCREASE TO 7% FOR ALL TO SERVE MOST KIDS

Up to 3,030 birth-to-five CCSP slots could be funded if Virginia shifted to maximum 7% of income for all, including families in poverty, regardless of the number of kids.

- This shift would require technological and operational changes but would be possible as Virginia based copayments on household income prior to the pandemic.

MD OPTIONS: INCREASE COPAYS, SERVE MORE KIDS

An additional 100 birth-to-five MD slots could be supported if current copayments were doubled and families in poverty are charged a \$5/month copayment.

- Collecting copayments is new for MD as of FY25. While income is verified, exact household income is not currently collected. As a result, it cannot yet be determined if doubled copayments would exceed 7% of household income in the table below.
- Due to data limitations, it is not yet possible to estimate 7% of household income for MD families.** Policy shift is feasible but technical and operational changes would be needed.

VPI PARENTAL CONTRIBUTIONS

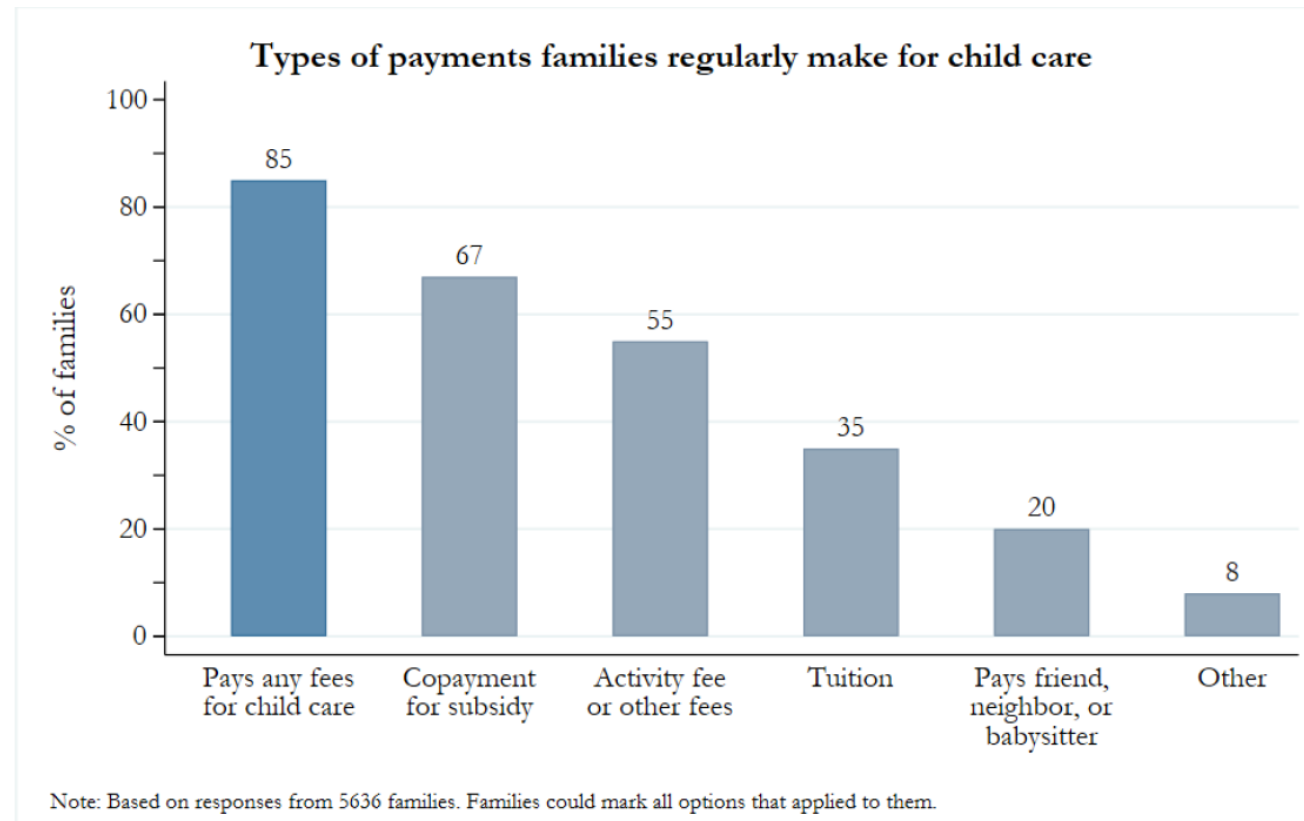
There are no required parental copayments for Virginia Preschool Initiative (VPI).

- Currently, there are no required copayments for families of 24,842 children who participate in VPI.
- Income eligibility is generally more restrictive than CCSP (e.g., under 200% of FPL) but there is some flexibility (e.g., children with disabilities).
- Families are *not* required to be working, in school/job training, or actively looking for work.
- **Due to data limitations, it is not yet possible to estimate 7% of household income for all VPI families.** Policy shift is feasible but significant technical and operational changes would be needed to implement.
- Virginia law requires local match by the local lead agency based on the composite index of local ability to pay. For VPI, composite index is capped at 0.50.

OTHER PARENTAL CONTRIBUTIONS

Providers have expressed concerns that official copayments only represent a portion of total parental contributions.

A 2023 University of Virginia Family Survey with 5,600+ respondents showed 85% were paying fees and 67% were paying copayments even though half should have no official copayment.

Job Search

JOB SEARCH: POINTS TO CONSIDER

- Virginia currently considers searching for work as an allowable activity, whether only looking for work, looking for work while in school, or seeking additional hours of work.
- According to JLARC, although local eligibility staff were generally supportive of helping parents access child care while they look for work, multiple staff voiced concerns that the program does not limit how long parents can search for employment and remain eligible for the subsidy.
- Federal regulations:
 - Allow states to place a time limit on job search of 90 days at initial eligibility.
 - Require states to provide a period of continued assistance of at least 3 months if parent(s) were working or in school and there was a non-temporary change (e.g., lay-off) to allow parents to engage in job search, resume work, or to attend an education or training program as soon as possible.
- Changing the current work requirements for Child Care Subsidy, Mixed Delivery and/or VPI requires a change to Virginia's Biennial Budget.

TIME LIMIT JOB SEARCH TO SERVE MORE KIDS

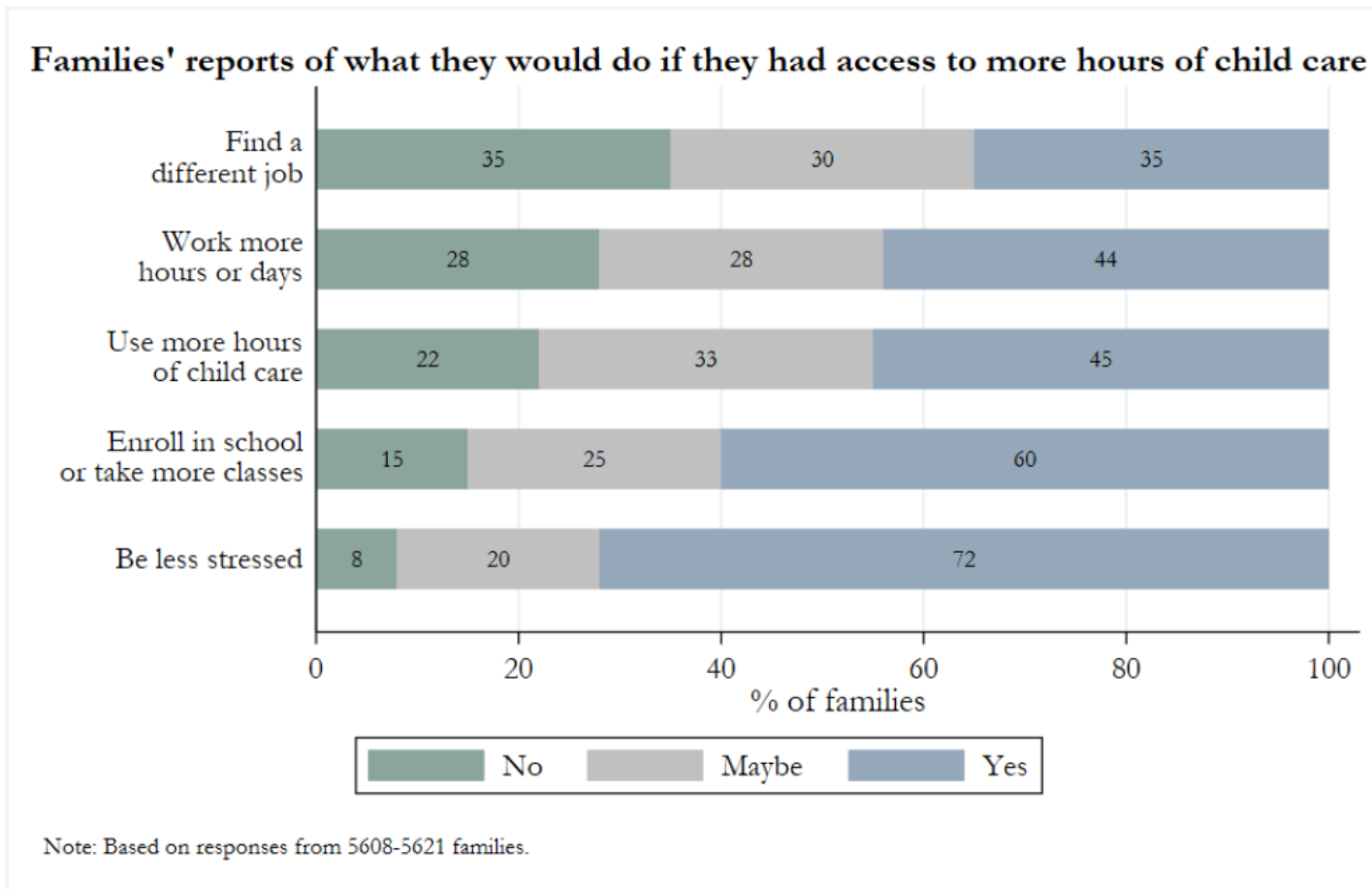
Eliminating eligibility for looking for work could provide up to 1,725 CCSP all-age slots. Time-limiting job search (90 days) could provide up to ~1,300 CCSP all-age slots.

FAMILIES SEEK TO WORK MORE OR UPSKILL

More than half of Virginia families reported that they would work more or seek to upskill if they had access to more child care, according to 2023 UVA Family Survey.

Update on Waitlists: Family Demand for ECCE

GREATER DEMAND FROM WORKING FAMILIES

As of October 1, there is unmet parental demand for all 3 state-funded programs for all ages and in all areas of the state. Chart below reflects growth in the CCSP waitlists.

- Growth in CCSP waitlists suggests that growing demand from working families for full-day, full-year options in private ECCE settings such as child care or family child care.
- There were no reported changes for MD or VPI. As a reminder, VPI waitlist numbers may not reflect actual families in need now. Actual VPI enrollment data, which is available in November, is needed to better understand unmet demand.
- It is not possible to disaggregate duplicate waitlist cases at this time, but VDOE is working with partners to determine how to account for duplication by December 1.

CCSP – UPDATE ON WAITLISTS AS OF OCT. 1

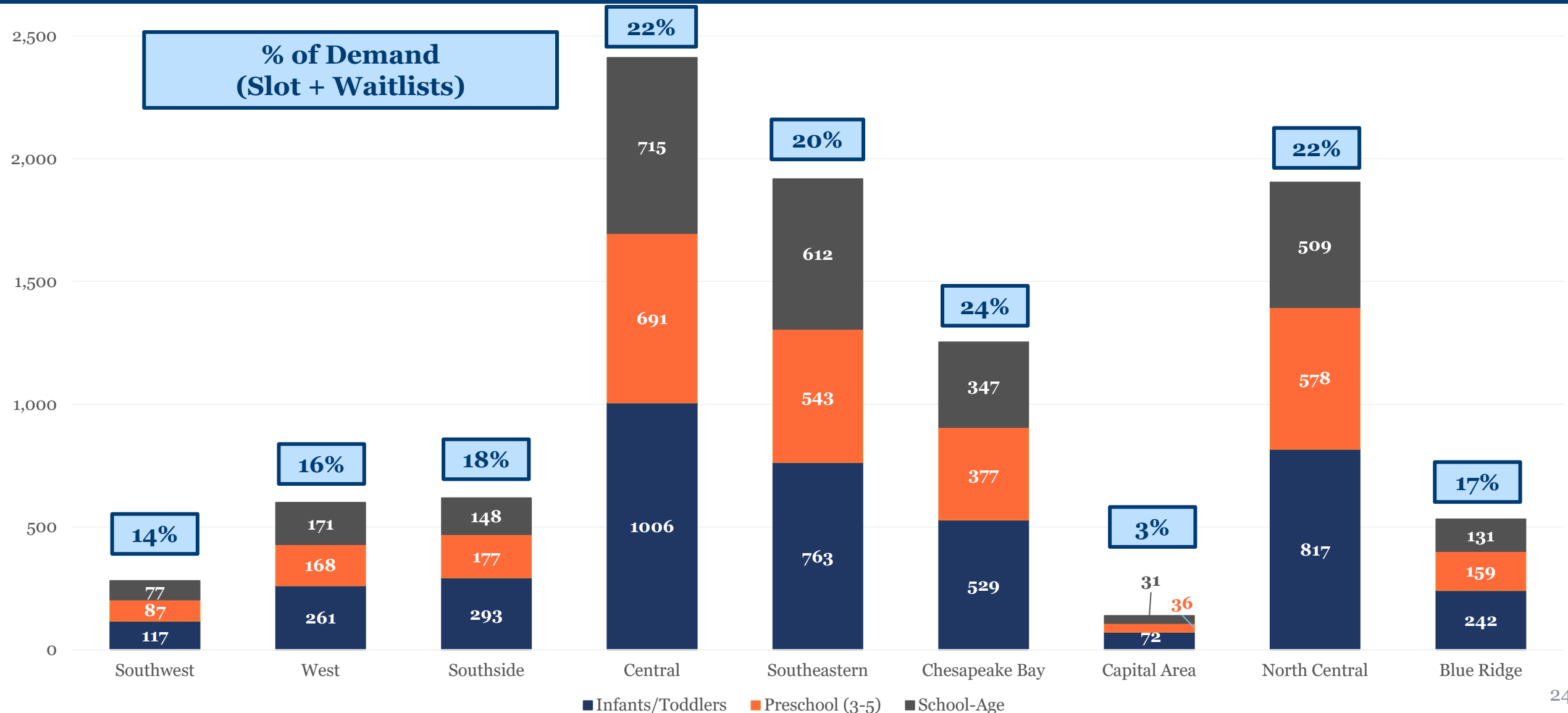
CCSP waitlists have increased to ~9,700 children but rate of growth is slowing.

- Localities (Local Departments of Social Services) began establishing waitlists as of July 1.
- Data was not measured at statewide level until July 28.
- As of Oct. 1, there are 9,657 children on CCSP waitlists including school-age children.

- Waitlists are maintained at the local level; 78% (93 of 120) localities have a waitlist.
- CCSP waitlist growth since:
 - September 1: + 1,991 children (+26% increase)
 - August 4: + 4,964 children (+106% increase)
 - July 28: + 6,028 (+166% increase)

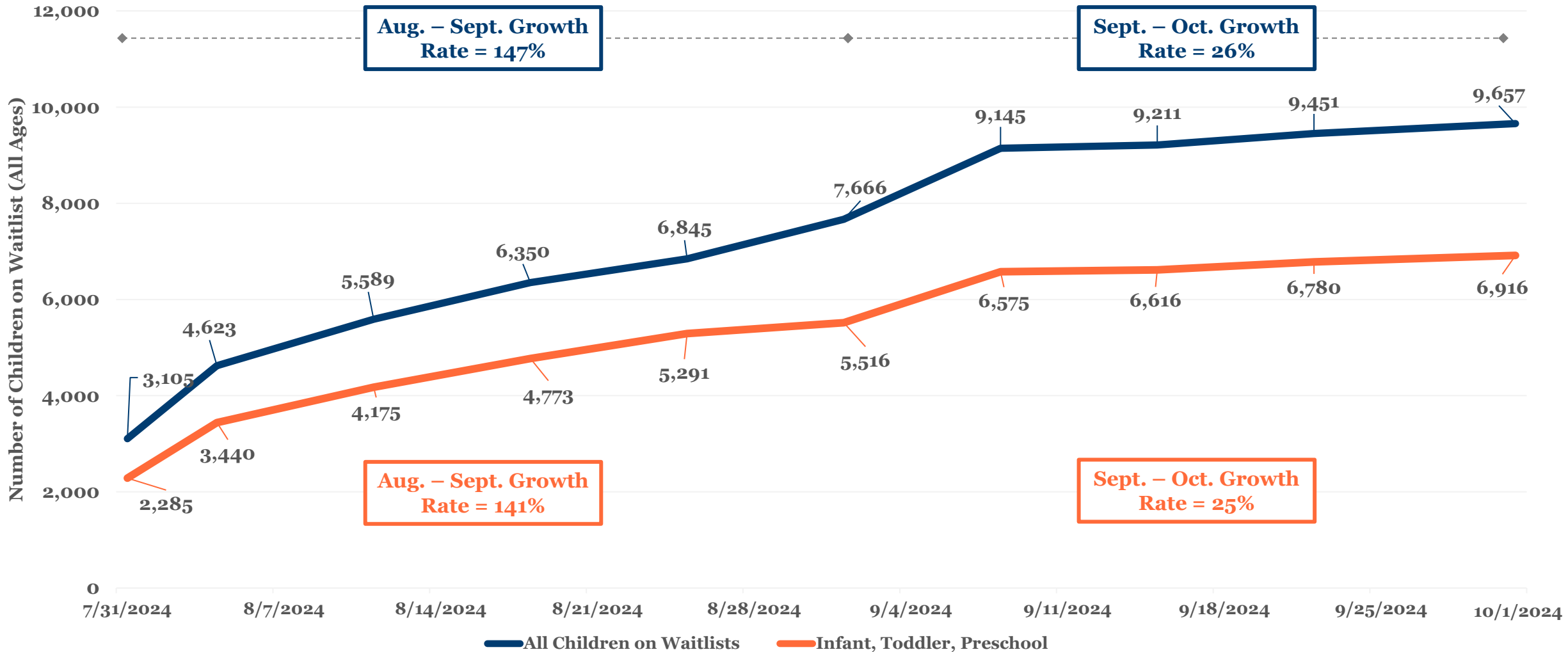

Calculating school-age weighted cost per kid separately would result in slightly higher overall investment of \$117 M to serve all 9,657 children on CCSP waitlists.

Launch of VQB5 Online Portal

VIRGINIA RELEASES 3,121 VQB5 SITE PROFILES

- On Tuesday, the VDOE released 3,121 VQB5 Quality Profiles.
- Parents can now access comparable information about quality and safety via an easy-to-use online portal. More than 1,800 stakeholders helped develop the online portal.
 - *Performance on Measures:* Quality rating = Classroom observation + Curriculum use
 - Information covers 28,000 rigorous observations = 2.1+ million minutes of insight into what young Virginia learners experience.
 - 85% of sites are now using quality curriculum.
 - *Site Information:* Address with map view, Contact information, Hours, Ages served, etc.
- Results indicate that Virginia's public-private early childhood programs positively impact children by providing warm, caring, and organized classroom experiences.
 - 130,000+ of Virginia's children under age 5 are in settings that meet state expectations.
 - Virginia has exemplars from across the public-private system. 79 sites including public schools, child care, family day homes, and Head Start earned *Exceeds Expectations* ratings.
 - 60% of these sites were in private settings which is preferred by Virginia working parents.
- Sites that need additional support are already receiving intensive supports.

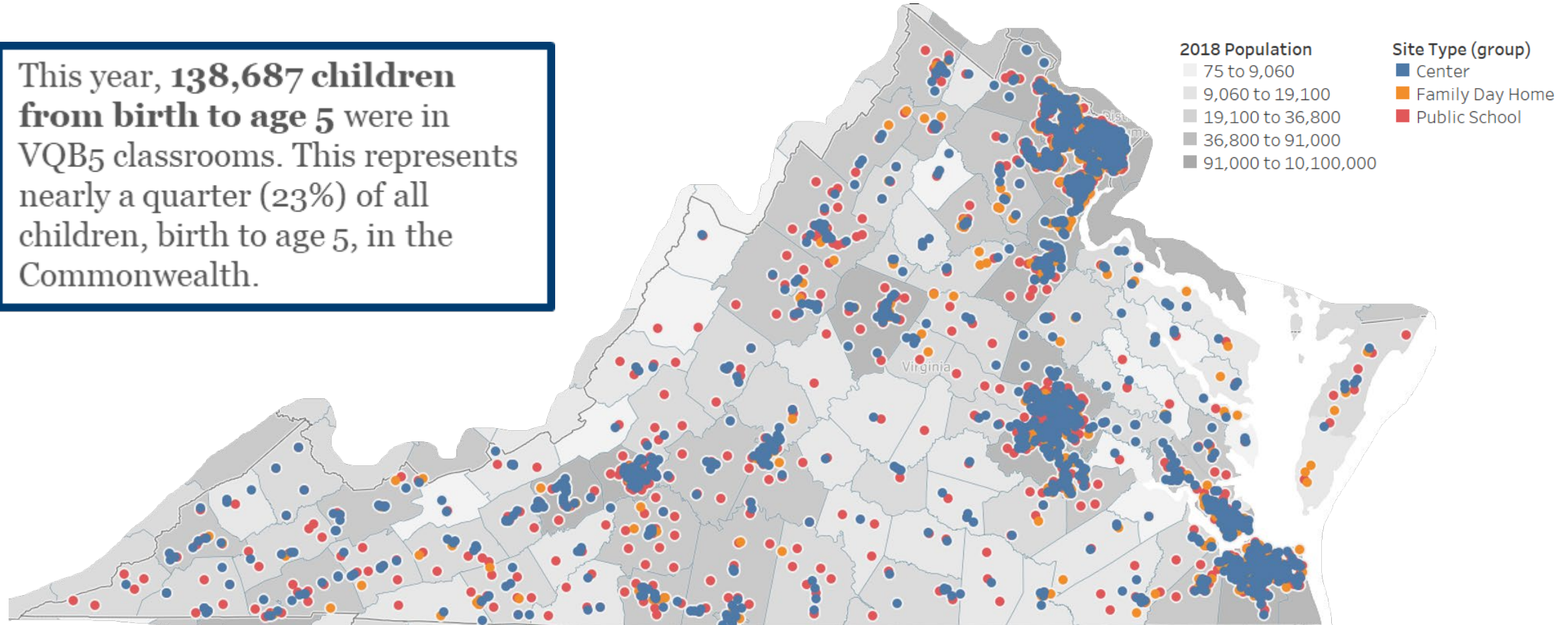

VQB5 SITES IN EVERY CITY AND COUNTY

The VQB5 Online Portal includes health, safety and learning information on early childhood programs in every city and county in Virginia.

This year, **138,687 children from birth to age 5** were in VQB5 classrooms. This represents nearly a quarter (23%) of all children, birth to age 5, in the Commonwealth.
